THE HEBREW SCRIPTURE READING

Isaiah 55:6-13

S eek the Lord while he may be found, call upon him while he is near; let the wicked forsake their way, and the unrighteous their thoughts; let them return to the Lord, that he may have mercy on them, and to our God, for he will abundantly pardon. For my thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways my ways, says the Lord. For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts. Luke 12:22-32

Deacon The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke.*People* Glory to You, Lord Christ.

Jesus said to his disciples, "Therefore I tell you, do not worry about your life, what you will eat, or about your body, what you will wear. For life is more than food, and the body more than clothing. Consider the ravens: they neither sow nor reap, they have neither storehouse nor barn, and yet God feeds them. Of how much more value are you than the birds! And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life? If then you are not able to do so small a thing as that, why do you worry about the rest? Consider the lilies, how they grow: they neither toil nor spin; yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. But if God so clothes the grass of the field, which is alive today and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, how much more will he clothe you—you of little faith! And do not keep striving for what you are to eat and what you are to drink, and do not keep worrying. For it is the nations of the world that strive after all these things, and your Father knows that you need them. Instead, strive for his kingdom, and these things will be given to you as well. He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

About the Creation Care Community of the Diocese of Long Island

CCCDLI was formed under the direction of the Bishop of Long Island, and consists of individuals who share a care for creation and a commitment to finding ways, as Christians, to address environmental degradation and climate change. The group had its first meeting of interested parties in late 2019. At the 2020 Diocesan Convention, the newly formed Creation Care Community submitted a resolution calling for a commitment to "the work of seeking right relationship with the created things of our environment through acts of repentance, justice-seeking, healing, activism, education, or witness".

The Creation Care Community Team seeks ways to partner with parishes and organizations across Long Island, and to advocate and give support to the work being done for the environment, as well as racial and economic justice. (See our Statement of Purpose included in this bulletin.) We have assisted in the formation of Green Teams in various parishes, and completed our first Green Teams retreat in October 2022. We are actively engaged in expanding solar energy use throughout the Diocese in cooperation with Long Island Progressive Coalition.
